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

You are Not Alone

Illness, depression, and misfortune can make us feel alone and afraid. We wonder whether anyone can understand what we're going through or help us.

The first five chapters of Mark's Gospel give us several healing stories in which Jesus, by touch or word, restores individuals to wholeness. He casts out demons. He cures the sick, like Simon's mother-in-law. The stories confirm what our faith tells us – that God's healing power is for all people and that good news lifts us and gives us joy.

But for those touched by the loneliness of infirmity of mind, body, or spirit, the stories alone might not be enough. Instead, the fervent prayer of the psalmist might be our grace: "The LORD... [heals] the broken-hearted" (Psalm 147:2-3). Or, our peace might rest in the simple knowledge of two often-overlooked lines from the Gospels: "They brought him many who were possessed by demons" (Matthew 8:16), and, "The whole town was gathered at the door" (Mark 1:33).

Simply put, everyone came, and no one was alone. No matter what our condition, we are not alone. Christ is there in our pain and suffering to give us the grace to endure. We're not always cured by human standards, but Christ helps us find wholeness no matter what we suffer – and in him we find our peace and our joy.

Isaiah told us that the name give to the Messiah was Emmanuel, which means "God with us."

In Christ, we see the evidence that God's promise has come true.

YOUTH REFLECTION

"Getting Well"

This Week...

Job, Paul, and Jesus all speak of their daily work experiences and what they are called to do. Job is unhappy because of all his suffering, and he sees his days as drudgery. Paul is almost a workaholic, focused on doing whatever it takes to spread the Gospel. Jesus cures the fever of Simon's mother-in-law, and her immediate response is to get up and serve them. Jesus escapes all the crowds early the next morning by finding a lonely place to pray, and from there he urges his followers to press on with him to other villages and continue their work.

For Your Reflection

In this Gospel story, Jesus sees his work as involving three areas: curing, teaching, and praying.

- Not only did Jesus cure the fever of Simon's mother-in-law but he cured many other ill people who came looking for him at her door. Obviously we can't cure sicknesses as Jesus did, but we can be a healing presence for someone going through a difficult time or a personal struggle. When and how have you done that for someone?
- Jesus wanted to travel to other villages to preach and teach. Are you a good student? Are you willing to listen and learn? Do you want to become more educated? How so? Obviously you can't be a certified teacher yet, but you can teach others by the example of your life. What can others learn from you by watching the way you live?
- Jesus escaped the crowds to pray. Do you ever need quiet time, away from noise and activity, so that you can make sense of the world? If so, how does that time help you? If not, how might that kind of time help you?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
