Santo Niño de Cebú is a Roman Catholic title of the Holy Child of Jesus based on a religious relic icon in Cebu City, Philippines. It is one of the oldest Christian Relics in the Philippines originally given in 1521 as a gift by explorer Ferdinand Magellan to Rajah Humabon and his wife when he landed on the island. The image received Papal recognition on April 18,1965 by Pope Paul VI. The feast is celebrated the third Sunday of January. The image is venerated as miraculous by many Filipino Catholics.

EUCHARISTIC ADORATION

Adoration is an act of faith and a gesture of love. Adoration is a "heart to heart" with God, a period of time presented with utter gratuity. By offering up my presence, I participate in the great offering of Jesus, that is, his life handed over "for the glory of God and the salvation of the world."

I bow slowly or I genuflect as a sign of respect in front of the tabernacle or before the Blessed Sacrament exposed on the altar.

To put myself in a state of recollection, I choose to sit or kneel. I close my eyes or I look at the host, a tangible sign of the presence of Christ.

In order to make a prayer of adoration I must be silent within myself: I must remove any sources of distractions which bother me or prevent me from letting God take over. I let go of all the concerns of the present moment to let God fill me with his love.

The Power of Christ's Invitation

Whether he knew it or not, Jonah was one of the most powerful prophets in Israel. He had scarcely started on his journey through Ninevah when the entire city under the direction of the king expressed sorrow for their sins and turned God's judgment to mercy. I think we all hope we might be that effective in our jobs.

If we to continue to read the Book of Jonah, though, we find that he wasn't so happy about this turn of events—he felt it made him look weak. Did he not predict the destruction of Ninevah if they failed to repent?

But for now, we see a people so moved by the word of God that they immediately change their behavior. In Mark's Gospel, Christ's invitation is just as compelling for the four fishermen who abandon their nets and their father by the sea and immediately change their direction and their lives.

I have a hard time imagining the words that would make me drop everything to follow a completely different path. Certainly I've taken the advice of friends and family or have responded to circumstances that demanded a new direction, but only after reflection and prayer—but it took considerably longer than a single moment.

The power of the good news, however, is unlike any other to those who are open to it. When we really hear God's voice, our hearts yearn to be in his presence and, though not always easily, our souls and minds bend to his will.


How is God's word calling you to change today?

YOUTH REFLECTION

"Answering the Call"

This Week...

Things can happen so quickly. "What a difference a day makes - 24 little hours," as the song goes. Nineveh changes overnight because of Jonah's preaching. Simon, Andrew, James, and John immediately abandon their fishing nets to become fishers of men and women. Paul tells us to be prepared because these things can happen. He exaggerates the point so we know how urgent it is to be ready to alter our life completely for God.

For Your Reflection

When Jesus comes by, the fishers who choose to follow him are immediately changed. Their daily lives are no longer spent watching the weather, fixing their boats, and hauling fish. Yet it takes them several years to understand their faith in Jesus and what it means to be a true follower and disciple.

Some changes can happen quickly, and things are immediately different. Some changes happen more slowly, and you can only see the difference over time, while looking back with a thoughtful eye.

- When you made the switch from junior high to high school (or from elementary school to junior high or middle school), what were the immediate changes in your everyday life? What were the changes that took time as you matured and became more adult-like and more comfortable with your new surroundings?
- What are some of the immediate daily changes that might have taken place in the Apostles' lives and in the lives of their family members? What gradual changes do you think their family members would have noticed in them over the course of three years or so?
- When you want to change yourself, how do you get from the stage of "just thinking about it" to the stage of "actually doing it"? What are some changes you would like to make in your own life changes that would make you a better person, changes that Jesus would approve of?
- If you truly live that way every day making changes that Jesus would approve of, being a better person how will that make you like the Apostles? How might you become like a fisher of other teenagers, looking for a better life?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
