What is the MISERICORDIAE VULTUS??



It is the Bull of Indiction of the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy, written by Pope Francis. Over the next several weeks excerpts of this 17-page document will be highlighted in the bulletin.

> "To all who read this letter grace, mercy, and peace." - Pope Francis, Bishop of Rome

Mercy is not opposed to justice but rather expresses God's way of reaching out to the sinner, offering 21. him a new chance to look at himself, convert, and believe. The experience of the prophet Hosea can help us see the way in which mercy surpasses justice. The era in which the prophet lived was one of the most dramatic in the history of the Jewish people. The kingdom was tottering on the edge of destruction; the people had not remained faithful to the covenant; they had wandered from God and lost the faith of their forefathers. According to human logic, it seems reasonable for God to think of rejecting an unfaithful people; they had not observed their pact with God and therefore deserved just punishment: in other words, exile. The prophet's words attest to this: ``They shall not return to the lad of Egypt, and Assyria shall be their king, because they have refused to return to me (*Hos* 11.5). And yet, after this invocation of justice, the prophet radically changes his speech and reveals the true face of God: `How can I give you up, O Ephraim! How can I hand you over, O Israel! How can I make you like Admah! How can I treat you like Zeboiim! My heart recoils within me, my compassion grows warm and tender. I will not execute my fierce anger, I will not again destroy Ephraim; for I am God and not man, the Holy One in your midst, and I will not come to destroy`` (11.8-9). Saint Augustine, almost as if he were commenting on these words of the prophet, says: "It is easier for God to hold back anger than mercy". And so it is. God's anger lasts but a moment, his mercy forever.

If God limited himself to only justice, he would cease to be God, and would instead be like human beings who ask merely that the law be respected. But mere justice is not enough. Experience shows that an appeal to justice alone will result in its destruction. This is why God goes beyond justice with his mercy and forgiveness. Yet this does not mean that justice should be devalued or rendered superfluous. On the contrary: anyone who makes a mistake must pay the price. However, this is just the beginning of conversion, not its end, because one begins to feel the tenderness and mercy of God. God does not deny justice. He rather envelopes it and surpasses it with an even greater event in which we experience love as the foundation of true justice. We must pay close attention to what Saint Paul says if we want to avoid making the same mistake for which he reproaches the Jews of his time: ``For, being ignorant of the righteousness that comes from God, and seeking to establish their own, they did not submit to God`s righteousness. For Christ is the end of the law, that every one who has faith may be justified`` (*Rom* 10.3-4). God`s justice is his mercy given to everyone as a grace that flows from the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Thus the Cross of Christ is God`s judgement on all of us and on the whole world, because through it he offers us the certitude of love and new life.

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus' command summed up the moral of the parable: Go out like the hated Samaritan. Do acts of mercy for whomever you meet.

As we travel this vacation season, let us remember that, in spite of the risks, we are to care for others as much as we expect to be cared for. Acting with such mercy is the first step in sharing the Good News.

Good News!

July 10, 2016 FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (C) Dt 30:10–14 / Col 1:15–20 / Lk 9:25–37

The scholar of the law had the right answer, but the wrong question. Love God with all your heart is the great Jewish law, and love your neighbor as yourself was part of the Holiness Code of Leviticus. But he asked, "Who is my neighbor," as though neighborliness was determined by a specific set of rules or restrictions: My neighbor is the person who lives next door, attends my child's school, or works in my field.

We, too, may think we'll help a neighbor, but a stranger—an outsider, a foreigner, someone who simply isn't "like me"—may be a different matter. For many, there are a few exceptions: When natural disasters strike, for instance, people reach out to help. They clear debris, send money, food, and supplies, and try to comfort the victims. In such circumstances, they are all neighbors.

Jesus turns the scholar's question around: "[Who] was neighbor to the robbers' victim?" This change put the responsibility of being a neighbor on us. The answer becomes, *I am a neighbour to everyone I meet*, whether stranger or friend, black or white, Christian or atheist, gay or straight, native or immigrant. Being a neighbor and loving neighbors is part and parcel of loving God and following Christ. Once I realize that, I must acknowledge two connected truths: God sees me as I am, loves me, and calls me neighbor; and the only conceivable response to that love is to see God in every person and to love them in return.

"The Good Samaritan"

This Week...

The most important law is not far away or difficult to understand. It is already in our heart, because it is the law of love. Jesus lived the law of love and shows us how to do the same. Jesus chooses a Samaritan to be the hero of his story, knowing that Jews are taught to despise Samaritans. Telling us this story about love is an excellent example of his own love.

For Your Reflection

Samaritans had a bad reputation among Jews. Jews regarded them as bad examples, people to avoid, people who did not follow God's law. Yet Jesus made a Samaritan the hero in his story. The priest and the Levite are people Jews were taught to respect and imitate, and yet Jesus made them the selfish and uncaring people in his story.

- Besides telling us to get involved and help other people, what else do you think Jesus was trying to teach us with this story?
- If Jesus came to us today, in our modern culture, how would he tell this story to get the same point across?

Sometimes we avoid getting involved with strangers because it might be dangerous, and sometimes we avoid it because we might have to spend some time and energy, or because we would feel awkward in doing so.

- What is an example of a dangerous situation when most people would agree that it would not be a good idea to get involved with a stranger in need?
- What is an example of a situation involving a stranger in need that is difficult to decide upon - a situation that isn't completely dangerous, but isn't completely safe either? What would you do in that situation? What advice would you give regarding appropriate action to take in that situation?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
