#### In Touch with the Word Sending Workers for the Harvest

#### **Scripture:**

oIsaiah 66.10-14

Rejoice and return to Jerusalem, a symbol of the house of God, where you will be welcomed as a mother welcomes and comforts her children.

∘Galatians 6.14-18

Paul is defending his status as an Apostle – the scars from his floggings and stonings mark him as a follower of Jesus.

•Luke 10.1-12,17-20

The harvest is rich but the labourers are few. So Jesus sends seventy disciples, in pairs, to visit towns, cure the sick, and preach. They return successful and rejoicing.

#### Theme:

The harvest master needs workers for the harvest. There are so few workers that the task seems impossible. But Jesus sends out the seventy disciples, in pairs, with confidence. They return in jubilation, welcomed by Jesus with open arms, the way Isaiah describes the welcoming and return to Jerusalem. They seem to do the impossible. But like Paul, they are clearly marked as followers of Jesus, and perhaps, like Paul, they have a few scars to show for it.

#### **Reflection:**

What impossible work – to be sent out as lambs among wolves, but to go with confidence, knowing you are sent by Jesus.

• Have you ever begun such an impossible task – not knowing how things would turn out, but knowing it was the right thing to do? Did you have any support? Or did people assume you would fail? What happened?

Thirty-five pairs of people walked to different towns, without any luggage, without much of a plan, not knowing where they would be staying or how they would be received. Yet they journeyed.

- When you travel, what is the biggest stress? What is the worst inconvenience of not being at home?
- Would you ever travel to a foreign land under the conditions described in the Gospel?
- Do you enjoy travel enough to see such a situation as an adventure? Or is traveling, even to a familiar place, so stressful that you would never want to go someplace without a planned itinerary?
- What meaning does the story of the sending of the seventy have for your life journey?

#### The "Gospel" of Health and Wealth

There's a current in modern Protestantism that is popularly called the "prosperity gospel." Although rejected by many Protestants, it still has its disciples. Its basic tenet is that if you're faithful and generous with God, he will bless you with prosperity in this life. The kind of prosperity expected is usually health and wealth. The natural conclusion is that economic blessings are signs of your faith. The opposite would also be true. If you are poor, you just might lack faith or God's favor.

Without a doubt God promises us prosperity. Just look at the prophesy of Isaiah in today's reading. Yet, as always for Christians, we have to read the Old Testament in the light of Christ and his revelation in the New Testament. The life of Jesus, the Son of God, was the most prosperous life ever lived. Yet, he wasn't rewarded with material wealth. In fact, he was downright poor. Although he was faithful and generous, God blessed him with challenges and, ultimately, the cross.

Paul didn't glory in his apostolic successes but in the cross of Jesus. He knew that the victory of the cross was his greatest treasure. He saw in his difficulties not a curse, but a sign of his true authenticity as a follower of Christ.

We should no doubt strive for sufficient material progress and prosperity for ourselves, our family, our business, and our nation. But above all we should strive for eternal prosperity, which is living and rejoicing that our names are written in heaven, whether we are materially wealthy or not.

Sunday, July 24, 2022 marks the Second World Day of Prayer for Grandparents and the Elderly. On this day you may obtain a plenary indulgence.


For the elderly, you may obtain this plenary indulgence by either attending Mass or participating in a Mass on TV, the radio or on a livestream.

#### "Sending Workers for the Harvest"

#### This Week...

The harvest master needs workers for the harvest. There are so few workers that the task seems impossible. But Jesus sends out the seventy-two disciples, in pairs, with confidence. They return in jubilation, welcomed by Jesus with open arms, the way Isaiah describes the welcoming and return to Jerusalem. They seem to do the impossible. But like Paul, they are clearly marked as followers of Jesus, and perhaps, like Paul, they have a few scars to show for it.

#### For Your Reflection

We don't know their names, but we know that three dozen pairs - thirty-six partnerships - set out on this adventure, not knowing what to expect. They took no suitcases, no supplies, no map, and they had no plan. Yet they trusted Jesus, and they went because the harvest was ready and there weren't many workers. Jesus needed them.

- Would you have gone on such a journey if you had been around in those days with Jesus and he asked you to? Why or why not?
- If you wanted to go on a mission trip with a church group that had the same expectations as this trip with the seventy-two no luggage, no plan, no supplies, and the like would your parents let you go? Why or why not?
- Would you be willing to do it as an adult? Why or why not?
- Do Jesus' instructions for the seventy-two disciples have any meaning for your life journey?

These seventy-two followers seemed to "do the impossible." They had a mission, they had confidence, and they succeeded.

- Have you ever attempted to do the impossible? What happened? Were you successful? What did others think?

**RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)** is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

**Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church.** If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.

Each time we offer up a Mass for someone, living or dead, we celebrate the greatest gift of our faith – the gift of Everlasting Life in Christ.
