A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Now we are coming back to Ordinary Time. For us, as Catholics, Ordinary Time is the part of the year when Christ, the Lamb of God, walks among us and transforms our lives. Because Christ journeys with us He, therefore, is teaching us and never ceases calling us to follow him. It is what the Gospel for this weekend talks about. In my message I would like to ask you to wonder and reflect on what Jesus means when he says: "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head... Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God... and No one puts a hand to the plough and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God."

Luke tells us a story that Jesus is traveling to Jerusalem, and along the way, he meets three men who have heard his call in their hearts. These encounters teach us three tough lessons about what it means to follow Christ:

1. To follow Christ, we have to relocate our sense of security from ourselves towards God. We have to learn how to rely wholly upon God, put all our efforts in life into God's grace. I believe that this is what Jesus means when he says that "foxes have holes and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head."

Indeed, we have to learn how to rely on God, to put our trust in him, and how to entrust our life into God's hands. We do not know what the future is, but we are called to celebrate our life in every moment. When we join Christ's followers, we have to hand him a "blank check."

2. But to follow Christ also means actively taking risks. Letting the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God means leaving behind one's plans and comfort zones in order to put all what we have in God's hands.

When we follow him, we have to agree to go one step and one day at a time - he refuses to give us a full-life outline in advance. When we follow him, we have to stop pretending that we can keep our lives under control by our own efforts. By accepting Christ's guide, we agree to put our lives under his leadership. Being His messengers and proclaiming His message is our priority mission.

3. And to follow Christ means persevering through difficulties. Christ asks us to put one's hands to the plough and never look back. If we want to follow Christ, we have to expect difficulties. Once we decide to follow Christ, there will be times when we will feel like turning back, because it will be hard work. But if we do turn back, we may lose our place in the Kingdom - he loves us too much to force us to persevere.

Jesus doesn't promise us an easy life if we follow him. He challenges us and invites us to "enter through the narrow gate; for the gate is wide and the road is easy that leads to destruction, and there are many who take it. For the gate is narrow and the road is hard that leads to life, and there are few who find it" (Mt 7.13-14). Those who follow him are required to sacrifice and give up themselves in order to belong to Christ and His faithful following.

Luke tells us that "when the days drew near for him to be taken up, Jesus set his face to go to Jerusalem." He knows what is waiting for him in Jerusalem but he keeps going because he knows that through the cross will be His glory, through the suffering and death he will be raised from death.

Do we want to follow him to share his victory with him?

Stay the Course to Jesus

One characteristic of Luke's Gospel is that he arranges most of Christ's preaching within a long journey from Galilee to Jerusalem. Jesus leaves behind his home in the north and travels south towards Jerusalem where his passion and death await. But Jesus places his steady focus is on his true homeland—heaven. That should be our main goal as well.

A farmer who plows a furrow or tills between rows of crops cannot be looking back at what he has already plowed, or he will inevitably stray off course. He keeps looking forward towards the end of the line. In the same way, we cannot constantly look back at the pleasures, opportunities, and goods we have left behind to follow Our Lord.

Elisha burns his plow in sacrifice and also to express his definitive yes to the call. Like an explorer who burns his ships upon reaching a new land, his acceptance of Elijah's invitation to be God's prophet is total; there is no turning back.

As disciples of Jesus, we are called to a yes with no ifs, ands, or buts. Contradictory as this may seem, this is true freedom. Freedom isn't doing what we want, when we want. This is actually slavery to our whims and constantly changing passions. We go nowhere and build nothing. Real freedom is having an unbounded capacity to recognize the truth, choose what is good, and live in the beauty of a life directed toward where we've set our hearts and minds.

YOUTH REFLECTION

"Nowhere to Lay My Head"

This Week...

Elisha slaughters his animals and destroys his farming equipment before following Elijah. His whole previous life is over. Paul teaches us that we are freed by Jesus to follow the Spirit, in love and service to each other, being careful not to bite and tear each other up in the process. Jesus stresses the cost of discipleship - giving up your whole life to follow, and not always having a place to lay your head.

For Your Reflection

Jesus is telling us how hard it is to be a follower. Sometimes we have to make sacrifices and give up part of our life. Sometimes we will have no place to rest our head because our schedule is so intense or because we are not among friends.

- What do you think it means to be a follower of Jesus? What hardships might it entail?
- Is anything worth these hardships? Who could dedicate their life to anything so demanding?
- Do you think Jesus was exaggerating to make a point?
- Religious life, marriage, parenting, and certain careers make incredible demands on one's life. What do you think are the most demanding life choices? How so?
- What would you be willing to make life-sacrifices for? What sacrifices would you make?

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RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.

OFFERING A MASS

The offering of a Mass in the name of a deceased family member or friend is one of the greatest ways to keep our beloved dead in our living memory. At each celebration of the Mass, the great prayer of sacrifice is made complete as Jesus' life, death and resurrection is offered to God the Father. When we offer a Mass for a particular person, we ask that in a special way the individual be remembered by the priest who offers up the great sacrifice on behalf of the whole community of faith. In a very real and active way, the life, death and resurrection of the person remembered becomes present and is offered up with Jesus. Each time we offer up a Mass for someone, living or dead, we celebrate the greatest gift of our faith – the gift of Everlasting Life in Christ.
