Please follow these important notes:

- **Pre-registration for Saturday/Sunday Mass is required.** Online at www.stgerard.ca Monday morning to Thursday at 12 noon. Please note that confirmation of your request may be delayed.
- Each household must register separately.
- Masks are mandatory are to be worn prior to entering the building. **Please arrive early.**
- *At least two-metres physical distance is to be observed at all times, even with masks on (masks are an additional measure of protection).*
- The following must stay home for the sake of the wider community:
 - ❖ People with COVID-19 symptoms, who live with someone with COVID-19, or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19
 - ❖ Those who have travelled outside of the province or Canada within the last 14 days
 - ❖ Those who are waiting for COVID-19 test results

A Note from Your Pastor...

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

As I prepare this message to you, I hear the good news from the government that as of March 19 we can welcome 150 people or 30% of the church's capacity. Thanks be to God for this change. I am happy that more parishioners are able to gather as a family to celebrate the Eucharist after the capacity having been reduced to 30 people.

We need to remember to keep to the public health guidelines such as wearing masks, sanitizing hands and maintaining social distance. We need to be patient and wait until all of our community receives the vaccine before going back to normal.

At the same time, we hear marvelous words in the Gospel of this weekend: *“God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life”*. These words summarize the whole of the Good News and show us that it was God who sent His Son to us, it was God who took the first step to reconcile us to himself.

Through these words, God chose the approach of love, not of power. God acts not for his own sake but for our sake. God is the Father, who is not happy until all of his wandering children have come home.

In the past people had been presented with a picture of God as stern, angry and unforgiving. Now we see Jesus as being kind, gentle, and forgiving. By his death, Jesus changed our attitude of God.

At this time, I invite all of you to do a reflection on Nicodemus for he is at the centre of the Gospel today.

According to the Gospel of John, Nicodemus appeared three times. The first time is in the Gospel today. We are told that he was impressed by the teaching of Jesus. So he came to see Jesus but it was at nighttime as he didn't want to be seen. Given the fact that he was a Pharisee, it is a wonder that he came at all. Jesus welcomed him and joined him in a long conversation.

By the second time that Nicodemus appeared, the Pharisees had made up their minds to kill Jesus, and were ready to do so without even giving him a trial. But Nicodemus intervened, declaring that Jesus should at least be given a fair hearing as the law demanded. He defended it... He said, *“Our law does not judge people without first giving them a hearing to find out what they are doing, does it?”* (John 7.51)

And the third, the last time that Nicodemus appears, is at the burial of Jesus. It was he who provided a large quantity of expensive spices for Jesus' burial. (John 19)

At the first appearance, Nicodemus was an open-minded man. He wanted to seek the truth. During the second appearance he was a fair-minded man and he insisted that Jesus should not be condemned without a trial. And at the third appearance he was a wealthy man, but also a generous and compassionate one.

I think we can emulate all of these qualities. But what Nicodemus seems to have been unable to do was to come straight out and make a full and a public act of faith in Jesus. He doesn't seem to have had the courage to come out of the darkness and choose the light.

Reflecting on the character of Nicodemus should challenge us to come out from the shadows and not to be afraid or ashamed to profess openly our faith in Jesus, and to be ready to pay whatever price is required for doing so.

My dear sisters and brothers, *“Those who believe will not be lost, but will have eternal life”*. It is not simply a matter of believing, but of living according to that belief.

I am looking forward to welcoming more people back next weekend. Remember that we will have four Masses each weekend. I hope to see you at one of these services.

We praise and thank God for all his blessings and being with us. Have a wonderful week and enjoy the beautiful weather. Love you all.

Solemnity of St. Joseph



Every March 19 the Church celebrates the **Solemnity of St. Joseph, husband of Mary, and step-father of Jesus.** Joseph is not a major part of the New Testament and is not mentioned after Jesus' infancy except for the story of finding Jesus in the Temple. We know only that he was a carpenter in Nazareth, that he had a quiet life with Jesus and Mary, and we assume that he died before Jesus left home for his public ministry.

It seems comforting to think of St. Joseph living this ordinary and humble life with Mary and Jesus, doing things families do, with no fanfare or special attention. His role on earth was to love and nurture Mary and Jesus and the assumption that a loving Jesus and Mary were both with him as he died led to devotion of Joseph as the Patron Saint of a Happy Death.

Bringing Home the Word

Healed through His Wounds

Jesus refers to the story Michelangelo painted into a corner of the Sistine Chapel, *The Brazen Serpent*. It is about the time the Chosen People were attacked by serpents and many were dying. God instructed Moses to place two serpents on a staff and lift it up over the people. All they had to do was look at the serpents to be miraculously healed of their bite wounds.

We have all been bitten by sin. This can be our own self-destructive choices and attitudes, or we can be victims of other's sins. Yet sin and suffering doesn't need to have the last word. We can overcome if we choose to look at Christ crucified and learn his lesson of love. Jesus teaches us to not be defined by our ugly choices or the wounds we suffer. Our wounds and weaknesses can become the place of our healing. Jesus wants to heal us. That is why he let himself be lifted up!

To embrace this healing is simple yet challenging. First it requires simple faith to believe you are loved by the Father, no matter what. Second, we need a constant, often-denied effort on our part to sincerely repent and work with God's grace to transform self-limiting attitudes and habits into virtues.

Even if you feel dead in your transgressions now, Jesus has already secured your path to life. Grace awaits you. The first step is to accept the love from he who is lifted up with arms outstretched to receive you.

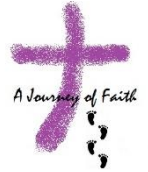

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
