

November 22, 2015 OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE (B)

Dn 7:13-14 / Rv 1:5-8 / Jn 18:33b-37

Like many people, when I hear the words "king" and "queen," I have an image formed by fairy tales and historical novels. The rulers of countries live in castles. They wear crowns and long capes and sit on thrones while their loyal subjects pay them homage. While I am aware that modern kings and queens wear "regular" clothes unless tradition dictates otherwise and that castles have become more contemporary, I still watch royal weddings for a glimpse of the pageantry that fed my childhood fantasies.

Pilate had an idea of what kings were like, too. In the first century, kings made laws and led people into battle. They had great armies and were a danger to another country's way of life. The Jews kept talking about a Messiah who would become king and destroy Israel's enemies. Pilate wasn't taking any chances. For Rome's sake, he would get rid of anyone who seemed a threat.

What Pilate failed to realize was that Israel's king had a very specific function, and it was not to make laws or lead armies. Instead, the king was to study and obey the Law of God and become himself the example of obedience (see Dt 17:18– 20). When Pilate called Jesus "the King of the Jews," his words were truer than he knew, for Jesus was obedient to his Father, even unto accepting death for our sake. But Pilate had no idea why he was right because he was thinking in human terms.

Today we honour Christ, the king of the Jews, of all of us, and of the whole universe. Let us see him as he is and do as he does.

"A Kingdom Not of this World"

This Week...

Jesus says that his kingdom is not of this world. He further says that he came into the world to testify to the truth, and that those committed to the truth will hear his voice. The apocalyptic readings from Revelation and Daniel certainly describe a king who is not limited to this world. But our main task as followers of Jesus and disciples of his way is clear: we are to work in order to bring the kingdom of God into this world. It will not be the kind of kingdom we often think of, with a dominating, oppressive ruler and cowering subjects. It will be a Reign of peace and love, forgiveness and nonviolence.

For Your Reflection

Jesus tells his closet friends that he is the Messiah, the One chosen to come and lead Israel into a new way of life. Only, their idea of a messiah king is different. They are waiting for a Jewish political leader who will take over the nation and destroy their enemies, then persecute them the way the Jews have been persecuted by the political powers of their time. The ways of Jesus are different. He is a "king" of nonviolence, forgiveness, unconditional love, and service.

- How would this difference in the expectations of a messiah king affect the perceptions of Jesus' followers?

- How might it lead to them doubting that he is truly the Messiah?
- How might it explain their cowardice at the time of Jesus' arrest and trial?

The Lord's Prayer we pray at Mass every Sunday includes this line: "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven."

- What does it mean for the Kingdom to come to earth, the same way it exists in heaven? What would that look like?

- What would the world be like if everyone on earth did the will of God?

- What part do you play in bringing to this world the Kingdom Jesus has in mind? Are you playing your part? If so, how? If not, why not?

- It takes courage to play your part. When have you done something courageous for the Kingdom of Jesus? What happened? When have you had the chance, but not the courage you needed? What happened?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
