INSTRUCTIONS FOR ATTENDING MASS

- Pre-registration is not required at this time.
- <u>Please wear a mask</u> from the time that you leave your vehicle, and from the time you leave the church until you arrive at your vehicle. Thank you.
- Members of the same household may sit together at the marked seating.
- At least two-metres separation is required between households.
- Please arrive early so that you can provide your name and telephone number for contact-tracing purposes.
- The following must stay home for the sake of the wider community:
 - People with COVID-19 symptoms, who live with someone with COVID-19, or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19
 - The sick, including those with a fever, cough, sore throat, runny nose, shortness of breath
 - Those who have travelled outside of Canada within the last 14 days
- Remember, there is still a risk for anyone who attends Mass, even with best health practices, strict personal distancing, and improved cleaning

A Note from Your Pastor.....

My dear Sisters and Brothers,

First of all, I want to turn your attention to the Responsorial Psalm in today's liturgy: Psalm 23, The Lord is my Shepherd. This is a very popular Psalm, a favourite Psalm that we all love and often use in our prayers.

Today we recite this psalm: *The Lord is my Shepherd... He makes me lie down in green pastures; he leads me beside still waters, he restores my soul. He leads me in right paths, for his name's sake. Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil; for you are with me... You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord... (Ps 23).*

We all have experienced the greatness of the Lord, how he loves and takes care of us because He is our Shepherd. Only God knows what is truly best for us. Just as parents always want the best for their children, God wants the best for us too because we are His children. Day by day He is calling us to a deeper and more meaningful life here on earth as St. Irenaeus states, "*the Glory of God is a human being fully alive*". God is calling us into intimacy with him. He is calling us into communion with others, too, he never stops calling us and then, at the end of our earthly life, he will call us into eternal life.

However, we hear in today's Gospel the story of the banquet when people refused the invitation. Therefore, I would like to invite all of you to reflect about the ways we respond to God's invitation.

The banquet in the Gospel represents the fullness of life to which God is calling us. It is an image describing the blessings God wishes on His people. Not only on Israel but on all nations. It is a call to intimacy with God and to a deeper relationship with Him, but it is also a call to community with others.

Every weekend we gather in the church, God's house, to celebrate and to participate in the Holy Banquet of the Eucharist. We come to the church because God, in His love, has invited us, and we have accepted His invitation.

We are religious people. We have faith. We exercise our faith by coming to celebrate what we believe, and through it we receive His graces from the sacraments. His graces strengthen us, and then we will exercise our faith and be witnesses for His love and mercy in our daily life.

What we celebrate now we will one day celebrate in heaven. At the Last Supper the Lord himself invited his disciples' attention toward the fulfillment of the Passover in the kingdom of God: "*I tell you I shall not drink again of this fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom*". Therefore, whenever we celebrate the Eucharist we are reminded of His promise and we say: "Come, Lord Jesus!"

My dear Sisters and Brothers, The Catechism of the Catholic Church says, "Having passed from this world to the Father, Christ gives us in the Eucharist the pledge of glory with him. Participation in the Holy Sacrifice identifies us with his Heart, sustains our strength along the pilgrimage of this life, makes us long for eternal life, and unites us even now to the Church in heaven, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and all the saints" (CCC 1419).

I would like to send to each of you my own invitation: Come to celebrate the Eucharist, save an hour every weekend for the Lord and others in our community. Come to celebrate our Thanksgiving. Open your heart and mind to accept the Lord's invitation and mine, as well. Remember that He doesn't compel us. No, He never pushes us. He invites us. A command cannot be so easily ignored, but an invitation can be.

I wish to each of you, and to all your family members, a very Blessed Happy Thanksgiving. We praise and offer our Thanks to God because: "*Praise the Lord, all you nations! Extol him, all you peoples! For great is his steadfast love toward us, and the faithfulness of the LORD endures forever. Praise the Lord!*" (Ps 117).




News from the CWL

Jubilee for the Earth Reflection

Education in environmental responsibility can encourage ways of acting which directly affect the world around us, such as avoiding the (over-)use of plastic and paper, reducing water consumption, separating refuse (for recycling), cooking only what can reasonably be consumed, showing care for other living beings, using public transport or car-pooling, planting trees, turning off unnecessary lights, or any number of other practices. We must not think that these efforts are not going to change the world. They benefit society, often in ways we do not recognize, for they call forth a goodness which inevitably tends to spread. Furthermore, such actions can restore our sense of self-esteem; they can enable us to live more fully and to feel that life on Earth is worthwhile. (212)

Can ordinary carefulness like that really change the world? Pope Francis is urging those of us who advocate for such habits of carefulness to remember the heights and the depths of what is at stake. *Dialogue

It is not merely about taking care of things and learning to be frugal. Pope Francis is talking about a life of virtue which opens up to an experience of God ("making the leap towards the transcendent") – God, lovingly present in every layer of creation; God, always beckoning us towards deeper love of our human neighbour, anywhere in the world. *Dialogue

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We're the Supporting Cast

Life can make us think we are in control of our lives. We plan, think, execute and succeed (or fail). Then along coms an illness, an accident, a job loss, or one of countless other things, and we realize we really aren't in control of much. This famous phrase sums it up: Man proposes, God disposes.

We can transfer this same false assumption into our relationship with God and expect Mass, prayer, and liturgy to work for us, fill us, and entertain us. But liturgy and prayer are about giving God his glory above all else.

When we pray, and especially when we enter into communal liturgy, we are reminded once again that it is all about what God is doing. Isaiah says the Lord will provide for all people. God will provide! We might prepare, serve, or participate, but the director, produces, and main actor is God. We are the supporting cast. That is why liturgy is not so much about our planning, participation, or entertainment but about entering into harmony with God's action and praising him as he asks.

The same point can be found in the Gospel. The king sends out invitations for his son's wedding and prepares the feast. He adjusts to the unexpected lack of interest and invites others. the ones who arrive are the ones the master has invited.

It would be foolish for one of the invited guests to vaunt their importance. Their role is to humbly enjoy and gracefully help the king and the newlyweds to shine on their night!

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Your St. Gerard Parish COVID-19 Questions Answered

On March 18, 2020, Archbishop Donald Bolen, in keeping with the Code of Canon Law no. 87, granted to all the Catholic faithful dispensation from their Sunday obligation. <u>This is still in effect</u>.

What does this mean? As Roman Catholics, we have an obligation to attend Sunday Mass. Until further notice, Archbishop Don has granted an exemption from this obligation. For those who are unable or choose not to attend Sunday Mass at this time, you do not have to. Other ways to participate in Sunday Mass is to watch it on television or watch the YouTube Mass online, courtesy of Resurrection Parish & Christ the King Parish (Regina) and the Archdiocese of Regina.

Why do I need to wear a mask? All those who attend both daily and Saturday/Sunday Masses are asked to wear a mask. The parish has a small supply of masks for those who do not have one. Please remember to put your mask on before exiting your vehicle prior to entering the church. A mask protects you and others!

Why do I need to register each time that I arrive to attend Mass? In the event that someone who has attend Mass develops COVID-19, it is necessary for the parish to have the names and phone numbers of all in attendance for contact-tracing purposes.

Paul has known both feasting and fasting in his life, and in both situations Paul remembers God. Isaiah reminds us that our God calls us to feast. And Jesus reminds us that if we choose to decline our invitation to the Reign of God, then surely someone else will take our place.

For Your Reflection

What a story! It's not your typical wedding. The king is God. The first people invited are those who reject God's way of living. The second people are those who don't expect the invitation but are delighted when it comes, and they accept it whole-heartedly. And the person not properly dressed represents those who may say that they have accepted God's invitation, but whose life choices show that they have not yet really said yes to God.

- When have you been among the first group those who don't care about church, who don't want to be involved with anything "churchy," and who don't think faith is relevant today? What do you think Jesus would say to you about this attitude?
- When have you been among the second group those who see that faith is important, who try to live their faith by doing works of service, and who aren't embarrassed by their relationship with God? What do you think Jesus would say to you about this attitude?
- When have you been among the third group those who say that faith is important and yet don't really practice their faith? What do you think Jesus would say to you about this attitude?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
