REFUGEE COMMITTEE REPORT

In December 2014, after discussion with Fr. Francis Hengen (parish priest at the time), the Social Justice Committee decided to sponsor a refugee family. Mr. Abdul Ali with the Archdiocese of Regina Refugee Program came to give a talk to the committee. It was understood that we would need approximately \$30,000.00 to support the family for one year.

We had a few fundraisers - Wine and Cheese Evening, lottery for children table and wall unit, a steak supper, etc.

Our refugee family was originally from Eritrea. Berhan Johar left Eritrea 40 years ago. He fled to Sudan, went to Egypt and then Saudi Arabia. That is where he married Nuria who had fled also. They had 3 children in Saudi Arabia - Nada, Bilal and Besma. Unlike in Canada, if you are born in Saudi Arabia you are not a Saudi national if your parents are not. In the last few years the Saudi government became very harsh with non-Saudi nationals. So that is when the family applied for refugee status.

Our committee found a nice house for them to live in. The Refugee Committee collected donations for furniture and household goods. The house was made very comfortable for them.

The family arrived in Yorkton August 1, 2018. Many parishioners helped them with transportation for groceries, English classes, and medical appointments during their year in Yorkton. Berhan was hospitalized in November and had a surgery in Regina and then had eyes treatments. Nuria had eye surgery and new glasses. Nada and Bilal found part-time work at Giant Tiger and Save on Foods.

As they have family in Regina, and found it difficult in Yorkton as they did not have independent travel within the city and to Regina for appointments, they moved to Regina July 16, 2019.

They are very grateful for the support and help that they received,

The cost to sponsor them was \$34,543.00. This amount had been raised by generous donations of parishioners, and through fundraising efforts.

On behalf of the committee, I would like to thank all the parishioners that helped in anyway.

Learning How to Love By Mary Katharine Deeley

How do we best love God and one another? A student, wanting to become more like Christ in welcoming all people, decided that he would greet every one of his fraternity brothers every week and ask how they were and that he would say hello to the man who sat in front of the drugstore in town begging for change and invite him to lunch. In May, when it came time to see how he did, the student had indeed talked to his fraternity brothers every week and greeted the beggar, but he never did invite him to lunch. "I just couldn't do it," he said. "I was a little afraid of what it would mean. Would I be responsible to help him again?" We talked about it a little, and I invited him to put that question to God in prayer.

I'm not sure we have an easy answer to what it means to look someone in the face and invite him to share a meal. And I daresay not many of us would do what that student set out to do. But St. Paul urges us to "pursue righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness" (1 Timothy 6:11). That's a lifetime's work and possible only with the grace of God. Surely, as we grow in those virtues, we will come to see all people as worthy of our time and care without worrying about what might happen in the future. It may not be practical and it certainly won't be easy. But the demands of God's love compel us to try. And if we do so, we might not share the fate of the rich man in Luke's Gospel who learned too late how best to love.

YOUTH REFLECTION

"Lazarus and the Rich Man"

This Week...

Jesus and Amos probably would not have any trouble with people being so very rich, as long as there were not any people who were so very poor. But when the needs of the very poor are ignored or caused by the very rich, it is very troubling indeed. Because this rich man in the Gospel valued money over service, he ended up paying for his greed in the eternal fires. Paul's message for us is to remember to value God over everything, including money.

For Your Reflection

This story has two characters, and only one of the characters has a name. Usually, the main character of a story - the important one - is the one named, since being known by a name signifies status. But in this story, it is the poor man who has a name - Lazarus. The rich man remains nameless.

- If the story ended when these two people died, what would you think of the status of Lazarus and the status of the rich man? Who would have seemed the more significant character? Why?
- In the afterlife the rich man knows Lazarus by name. Do you think this means he might have known Lazarus by name while he was alive? If so, what kind of relationship do you think he had?
- The rich man allowed Lazarus to remain by his gate. Would you feel comfortable with a homeless, diseased man living in your backyard? Was the rich man more or less tolerant and compassionate than you might be? How does that affect you?
- We are a very wasteful society. Some have estimated that 50 percent or more of the food at restaurants is thrown out. Lots of hungry, homeless people could be fed with that amount of table scraps.
- Do you ever waste food? Are you more likely to throw food out if you are alone or if you are with your friends? What difference does it make, either way?
- Are there any opportunities for you to serve the needs of the hungry, such as in a food pantry or soup kitchen? What does your own church do for the poor and hungry? Would you like to become involved in some way? Why or why not?



RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
